The Cuyahoga County Board of Elections Meeting began at 9:34 a.m. Hereinafter referred to as the CCBOE/Board.

Chairman Hastings noted that all Board Members were in attendance.

Agenda Item 1: Approval of the minutes from the November 22, 2021, Board Meeting

Chairman Hastings moved to approve the minutes from the November 22, 2021, Board Meeting. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Agenda Item 2: Acknowledgment of Secretary of State Advisory 2021-06: Congressional Redistricting and State Legislative Redistricting

Chairman Hastings moved to acknowledge Secretary of State Advisory 2021-06: Congressional Redistricting and State Legislative Redistricting. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Agenda Item 3: Determination of the validity of provisional ballots and authorization to count provisional ballots from the November 23, 2021, Maple Heights Council District 6 Recall Election

Betty Edwards, Registration Department Manager, presented the Provisional Report to the Board as provided in the board meeting materials.

Chairman Hastings moved to approve the determination of the validity of provisional ballots and authorization to count provisional ballots from the November 23, 2021, Maple Heights Council District 6 Recall Election. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Agenda Item 4: Challenge of Right to Vote filed by David Sulik against Bonnie Shore

Chairman Hastings stated the Board received a Challenge of the Right to Vote filed by Mr. David Sulik against Ms. Bonnie Shore.

Betty Edwards, Registration Department Manager, acknowledged Mr. David Sulik was present to give testimony for the challenge, and Ms. Bonnie Shore was not present. Ms. Edwards stated a Challenge of the Right to Vote and Correction of Registration List, Secretary of State's Form 257, was filed by Mr. David Sulik. The challenge form alleges that Ms. Bonnie Shore has not lived at 2156 West 29th Street, Cleveland, Ohio, since 1994, and she votes using the 2156 West 29th Street address. The CCBOE Registration staff conducted an investigation into the voter registration record of Ms. Bonnie Shore. The following information was provided: 1) Ms. Shore initially registered to vote in Cuyahoga County on April 9, 1984, at 1354 West Boulevard, Apartment 8, Cleveland, Ohio, 44102. 2) In September 1999, Ms. Shore changed her address to 2156 West 29th Street, Cleveland, Ohio. Cuyahoga County 3) Property reports indicate Mr. Sulik purchased the property at 2156 West 29th Street in May 1994. Mr. Sulik contends Ms. Shore has not lived at the 2156 West 29th Street address since he purchased the property. Ms. Shore has regularly voted using the 2156 West 29th Street address and last voted on November 2, 2020. On October 10, 2021, Deputy Director Kaloger instructed Registration staff to flag Ms. Shore's voter registration as she must vote provisionally. Ms. Shore did not vote in the November 2, 2021, General Election. CCBOE staff tried to identify an address/contact information other than the 2156 West 29th Street address for Ms. Shore and no contact information was located. According to the Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Ms. Shore's Ohio Driver's license has expired and not renewed.

Chairman Hastings noted Ms. Shore had voted approximately 16 times. Ms. Shore has voted since 2004, and she is approximately 67 years old. The CCBOE staff also worked with the County Prosecutor's office using additional resources and could not locate Ms. Shore. The hearing notice was mailed to the 2156 West 29th Street address, which Mr. Sulik had in his possession, and he returned to the CCBOE.

Mr. Sulik testified he did not know Ms. Shore. In October of 1993, he stated he moved into a duplex located at 2156 West 29th Street, Cleveland, Ohio as a renter and subsequently purchased the house in 1994. Ms. Shore lived in one unit, and Mr. Sulik lived in the other unit. Mr. Sulik did not know Ms. Shore other than knowing she occupied the other unit. When Mr. Sulik purchased the home in 1994, Ms. Shore moved from her unit. Mr. Sulik has continued to receive the CCBOE voter information guide notices in the mail.

Chairman Hastings stated the only issue (despite the CCBOE's reasonable efforts) is Ms. Shore's due process rights since she has not been notified nor had an opportunity to be heard at this hearing. Chairman Hastings moved to cancel Ms. Bonnie Shore's registration based on the information and testimony from Mr. Sulik. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Hastings moved to refer this matter to the Prosecutor's office for further investigation. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Brian Cleary, Ballot Department Manager, presented information from the Board Packet concerning the certification of the official results from the November 23, 2021, Maple Heights Council District 6 Recall Election.

Chairman Hastings moved to certify the official results of the November 23, 2021, Maple Heights Council District 6 Recall Election. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Jessica King, Ballot Department Assistant Manager, presented information from the board packet regarding the certification of recounts from the November 2, 2021, General Election. She stated recounts

for the November 2, 2021, General Election began on November 29, 2021. There were five automatic recounts and two requested recounts. The hand-counted votes of the selected precincts matched the results of the official canvas. The precincts were rescanned and tabulated using electronic voting equipment. When the electronic tabulation matched the hand count and official canvas results, the remaining precincts were then rescanned and tabulated using electronic voting equipment. The recount in the Berea CSD Board of Education Member resulted in a change in one vote in Brook Park 3C. The DS850 high-speed scanner read an oval differently than the DS200 scanner. After physical inspection by a bipartisan team, the ballot vote was changed from an undervote to a vote for a candidate. The change did not affect the outcome of the race, and all candidate positions remained the same. However, the official certification results for the November 2, 2021, General Election will be amended by one vote.

Chairman Hastings moved to Certify the Recounts from the November 2, 2021, General Election for Berea CSD Board of Education Member, Lakewood Council at Large, University Heights Council at Large, Maple Heights CSD Board of Education Member, Mayfield Heights Council at Large, Euclid Ward 02 Member of Council, and Maple Heights District 05 Member of Council. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Hastings moved to amend the official certified results from the November 2, 2021, General Election. The amendment is a result of the one vote change in the Berea CSD Board of Education Member Recount. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Agenda Item 7: Acknowledgment of resignations from and appointments to elected office

Board Member Stickan noted a correction to the board documents regarding the resignation of Ann M. D'Amico, Highland Heights City Council. Ms. D'Amico is resigning from Highland Heights City Council Representative Ward 4, effective December 31, 2021, as she was elected to the position of Highland Heights Council at Large in the November 2, 2021, General Election.

Chairman Hastings moved to acknowledge the resignations from and appointments to elected office. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Agenda Item 8: Early In-Person Voting PEO Performance Report

Steve Doell, Candidate and Petitions Services Supervisor presented a summary regarding the Early In-Person Voting PEO Performance Report from the board packet.

Chairman Hastings moved to acknowledge the Early In-Person Voting PEO Performance Report. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Agenda Item 9: Approval to Renew the Ballot Printing Contract with Midwest Direct, under subdivision (B) Article I., in the amount not-to-exceed \$593,466.70 for the First Renewal Period January 1, 2022, through August 1, 2022

Board Member Wondolowski noted a correction to the agenda to indicate "the amount not to exceed as \$593,469.70."

Chairman Hastings moved to approve to renew the Ballot Printing Contract with Midwest Direct, under subdivision (B) Article I., in the amount not-to-exceed \$593,469.70 for the First Renewal Period January

1, 2022, through August 1, 2022. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Agenda Item 10: Approval of vouchers

Chairman Hastings moved to approve the vouchers. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Agenda Item 11: Approval of the personnel agenda

Chairman Hastings moved to approve the resignation of Kevin Zaremba. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Hastings moved to approve a two percent cost of living salary increase effective December 19, 2021, which will be reflected in the first 2022 pay date on January 7, 2022. The increase applies to all permanent employees on the Board payroll as of December 19, 2021. This adjustment was included as part of the 2022-2023 biennial budget. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Hastings stated that on November 23, 2021, the day of the Maple Heights Council District 6 Recall Election, it was determined a former CCBOE employee did not comply with the agency's Ballot Remake Policy by failing to remake 15 ballots in a bipartisan manner. Staff uncovered this CCBOE Ballot Remake Policy non-compliance while conducting quality assurance processes. The CCBOE staff determined that the absentee ballots were remade correctly and confirmed that all ballots cast were accurately tabulated for both the unofficial canvas, which took place on November 23, 2021, and the official canvass is taking place on December 8, 2021. Based on the investigations by Lori Acosta, Human Resources Manager, in conjunction with the Director and Deputy Director, information is being gathered for referral to the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office.

Chairman Hastings moved to refer Mr. Kevin Zaremba to the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office for appropriate follow-up with investigative information to be provided by the CCBOE staff. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Agenda Item 12: Acknowledgment of Cuyahoga County Council District boundary adjustments pursuant to Cuyahoga County Charter Section 3.04

Chairman Hastings moved to acknowledge the Cuyahoga County Council District boundary adjustments pursuant to Cuyahoga County Charter Section 3.04. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Reverend Pinkney Butts provided public comments regarding items on the agenda.

Director Perlatti provided updates to the Board on the following:

- Per an SOS Directive, the CCBOE is currently working on the voter cancellations which will take place on January 7, 2022.

- There will be an agenda item to approve Ward changes Euclid, Parma, and Bay Village at the next board meeting.
- There is a potential for a statewide petition to be filed with the Secretary of State next week, requiring staff to complete its review of the petitions by December 23, 2021.
- Director Perlatti stated there was also a group that circulated statewide petitions regarding mandating vaccines. When the CCBOE received the petitions from the Ohio Attorney General, the manner in which the petitions and associated paperwork for the petitions were compiled gave staff pause as to whether those who signed the petitions actually saw the text of what they were signing. The CCBOE inquired with other counties, and those counties experienced the same issue. The CCBOE processed the petitions and returned the petitions along with an explanation of the issue to the Ohio Attorney General. The CCBOE's conduct of processing and returning the petitions was consistent with other large counties.

At 10:34 a.m. Chairman Hastings motioned to go into executive session for the purpose of discussing employee compensation and discipline. Board Member Wondolowski seconded, and a roll call was taken, and each Board Member voted in the affirmative.

At 11:01 a.m., after returning from the executive session, Chairman Hastings motioned to come out of the executive session. Board Member Wondolowski seconded, and a roll call was taken, and each Board Member voted in the affirmative.

Chairman Hastings moved to adjourn the meeting at 11:13 a.m. Board Member Wondolowski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

RELEASED: January 7, 2022

SUMMARY

- Advisory 2022-01 informs county boards of elections that Attorney General Yost issued a formal opinion that attempts to address ambiguity in a statute enacted last year – R.C. 3501.054.
- R.C. 3501.054 generally prohibits a public official responsible for administering or conducting an election from **collaborating** with, or accepting or expending any money from, a nongovernmental person or entity for any costs or activities related to voter registration, voter education, voter identification, etc.
- The Opinion, among other things, clarifies the meaning of “nongovernmental entity;” distinguishes what a public official subject to the prohibitions may do in their official capacity versus their private capacity; and determines that other statutory duties and responsibilities for election officials are not repealed by the new law.
- Specific examples of permissible activities are provided as guidance.

OVERVIEW

A. R.C. 3501.054

On June 30, 2021, Governor Mike DeWine signed House Bill (“H.B.”) 110, the State Operating Budget for fiscal years 2022-2023. Included in the enacted law was R.C. 3501.054, which prohibits a “public official responsible for administering or conducting an election from collaborating with, or accepting or expending any money from, a nongovernmental person or entity for any costs or activities related to voter registration, voter education, voter identification, get-out-the vote, absent voting, election official recruitment or training, or any other election-related purpose, other than the following:

1. The collection of any fee that is authorized by law;
2. The use of any building to conduct an election, including as a polling place; or
3. (3) The donation of food for precinct election officials at a polling place on Election Day.”

B. Nongovernmental Entity Defined

The Opinion states that “a ‘nongovernmental’ person or entity is one who is neither a government official (in the case of a person) or a governing entity.” Notably, the Opinion specifically determines that a political party is a nongovernmental entity.

C. Clarification Regarding Prohibitions

The Opinion explains that the law’s prohibition against a public official collaborating with nongovernmental persons or entities only applies while the public official is acting in their official capacity. The Opinion states explicitly that the law does not prohibit a board of elections member from serving on a political party central or executive committee.

D. Meaning of “Collaborate”

The Opinion notes that neither the law nor any other part of the Ohio Revised Code defines the term “collaborate.” However, the Opinion states that “two or more parties ‘collaborate’ when they combine

their efforts to work toward a common goal” or rather, “collaboration entails ‘jointly administering a project.’”

1. What is prohibited “collaboration”

The Opinion does not explicitly provide examples of prohibited collaboration with nongovernmental persons or entities.

2. What is not prohibited “collaboration”

The Opinion notes that the following are examples of permissible activities: [\(below are common activities the CCBOE participates in\)](#)

- Setting up a booth to register voters or recruit poll workers at an event hosted by another entity
- Conducting voter education outlining voter identification, absent voters ballots, provisional ballots, and other voting requirements
- Advertising voter registration information in newspapers
- Providing election information to a nongovernmental person or entity, whether orally or in writing
- Speaking at, providing election information at, or conducting election activities (such as registering voters or recruiting poll-workers) at an event hosted by a governmental person or entity
- Publishing election information on a medium owned or hosted by a nongovernmental person or entity (such as a newspaper, radio or television broadcast, website or bulletin board), whether for free or as paid advertising
- Any other actions that election officials are authorized to perform by a section of Ohio law other than R.C. 3501.054.

E. Penalties

The Opinion notes that criminal statutes and penalties apply to violations of R.C. 3501.054, such as illegally collaborating with a nongovernmental entity for an election-related purpose. R.C. 3599.32 states, “No official upon whom a duty is imposed by an election law for the violation of which no penalty is otherwise provided shall knowingly disobey such election law.” The penalty is a first degree misdemeanor.

Every election official is potentially liable if they violate R.C. 3501.054’s prohibition in their official capacity. Every board member, director, and deputy director therefore must review the Opinion and Advisory 2022-01. Additionally, each board of elections director must share this Advisory and the Opinion with its legal counsel, the county prosecuting attorney.



ADVISORY 2022-01

January 7, 2022

To: All County Boards of Elections
Board Members, Directors, and Deputy Directors

Re: Ohio Attorney General Opinion No. 2022-001

BACKGROUND

This Advisory informs county boards of elections that Attorney General Yost issued a formal opinion that attempts to address ambiguity in a statute enacted last year.¹ [R.C. 3501.054](#) generally prohibits a public official responsible for administering or conducting an election from collaborating with, or accepting or expending any money from, a nongovernmental person or entity for any costs or activities related to voter registration, voter education, voter identification, get-out-the-vote, absent voting, election official recruitment or training, or any other election-related purpose.

As this Office noted in [Advisory 2021-03](#), the law did not define several key terms—for example, “collaborating,” “nongovernmental person or entity,” or “election-related purpose.” This ambiguity led to several county prosecutors requesting the formal Attorney General’s Opinion issued on January 4, 2022.

OVERVIEW

The Opinion, among other things: (1) clarifies the meaning of “nongovernmental entity;” (2) distinguishes what a public official subject to the prohibitions may do in their official capacity versus their private capacity; (3) determines that other statutory duties and responsibilities for election officials are not repealed by the new law; and (4) sets forth the relevant penalty for violations.²

A. R.C. 3501.054

On June 30, 2021, Governor Mike DeWine signed [House Bill \(“H.B.”\) 110](#), the State Operating Budget for fiscal years 2022-2023. Our Office issued [Advisory 2021-03](#) regarding this law. The enacted law, R.C. 3501.054, prohibits a “public official responsible for administering or conducting an election from collaborating with, or accepting or expending any money from, a nongovernmental person or entity for any costs or activities related to voter registration, voter education, voter identification, get-out-the vote, absent voting, election official recruitment or training, or any other election-related purpose, other than the following:

- (1) The collection of any fee that is authorized by law;
- (2) The use of any building to conduct an election, including as a polling place; or

(3) The donation of food for precinct election officials at a polling place on Election Day.”³

B. Nongovernmental Entity Defined

The Opinion states that “a ‘nongovernmental’ person or entity is one who is neither a government official (in the case of a person) or a governing entity.”⁴ The Opinion further explains that a ‘nongovernmental person’ is a person who is not (or is not acting in the capacity of) a public official” and “is not a public body established by law.” Notably, the Opinion specifically determines that a political party is a nongovernmental entity.⁵

C. Clarification Regarding Prohibitions

The Opinion explains that the law’s prohibition against a public official collaborating with nongovernmental persons or entities only applies while the public official is acting in their official capacity. Moreover, “nothing in R.C. 3501.054 explicitly limits a public official’s ability to collaborate with nongovernmental persons or entities when acting in his or her private capacity.” (Emphasis in original).⁶ The Opinion states explicitly that the law does not prohibit a board of elections member from serving on a political party central or executive committee.⁷

D. Meaning of “Collaborate”

The Opinion notes that neither the law nor any other part of the Ohio Revised Code defines the term “collaborate.” However, the Opinion states that “two or more parties ‘collaborate’ when they combine their efforts to work toward a common goal” or rather, “collaboration entails ‘jointly administering a project.’”⁸

1. What is prohibited “collaboration”

The Opinion unfortunately does not explicitly provide examples of prohibited collaboration with nongovernmental persons or entities, except to state that “R.C. 3501.054 prohibits public officials from collaborating with nongovernmental persons or entities only when the public official is acting in his or her official capacity.”⁹

2. What is not prohibited “collaboration”

The Opinion notes that the following are examples of permissible activities:

- Answering a non-profit organization’s questions about registration requirements
- Setting up a booth to register voters or recruit poll workers at an event hosted by another entity
- Publicizing information relative to registration or elections
- Conducting voter education outlining voter identification, absent voters ballots, provisional ballots, and other voting requirements
- Youth mock voting programs run by volunteers
- Advertising voter registration information in newspapers

- Recruiting high school poll workers at non-public schools
- Purchasing elections supplies
- Providing election information to a nongovernmental person or entity, whether orally or in writing
- Speaking at, providing election information at, or conducting election activities (such as registering voters or recruiting poll-workers) at an event hosted by a governmental person or entity
- Publishing election information on a medium owned or hosted by a nongovernmental person or entity (such as a newspaper, radio or television broadcast, website or bulletin board), whether for free or as paid advertising
- ***Any other actions that election officials are authorized to perform by a section of Ohio law other than R.C. 3501.054.***

E. Penalties

The Opinion notes that criminal statutes and penalties apply to violations of R.C. 3501.054, such as illegally collaborating with a nongovernmental entity for an election-related purpose. [R.C. 3599.32](#) states, “No official upon whom a duty is imposed by an election law for the violation of which no penalty is otherwise provided shall knowingly disobey such election law.” The penalty is a first degree misdemeanor (the most severe misdemeanor). If the person has previously been convicted of a violation of election law, the violation is a fourth degree felony under [R.C. 3599.39](#).¹⁰

Every election official is potentially liable if they violate R.C. 3501.054’s prohibition in their official capacity. Every board member, director, and deputy director therefore must review the attached Opinion. Additionally, each board of elections director must share this Advisory and the Opinion with its legal counsel, the county prosecuting attorney. SYLLABUS:

2022-001

1. For purposes of R.C. 3501.054, a “nongovernmental person or entity” is a person or entity that is neither an official nor a constituent part of a federal, state, or local government.
2. R.C. 3501.054 prohibits public officials from collaborating with nongovernmental persons or entities *only* when the public official is acting in his or her official capacity. It does not prohibit public officials from collaborating with nongovernmental persons or entities in the official’s private capacity. It does not, for example, prohibit a board of elections member from serving as a member or in a leadership role of a county political party central or executive committee.
3. As used in R.C. 3501.054, “collaborate” means to jointly administer a project.

4. The clause in R.C. 3501.054 that prohibits public officials from collaborating with non-governmental persons or entities does not prohibit a public official from performing any action that the public official is authorized to perform by a different section of the Revised Code.
5. R.C. 3599.32 provides the penalty for violating R.C. 3501.054.

Dear Prosecutor DeVine:

You have requested an opinion asking multiple questions about R.C. 3501.054. That law states, in relevant part:

- (A) As used in this section, “public official” means any elected or appointed officer, employee, or agent of the state or any political subdivision, board, commission, bureau, or other public body established by law.
- (B) No public official that is responsible for administering or conducting an election in this state shall collaborate with, or accept or expend any money from, a nongovernmental person or entity for any costs or activities related to voter registration, voter education, voter identification, get-out-the-vote, absent voting, election official recruitment or training, or any other election-related purpose, other than the following:

- (1) The collection of any fee that is authorized by law;
- (2) The use of any building to conduct an election, including as a polling place;
- (3) The donation of food for precinct election officials at a polling place on election day.

Your letter asks whether a number of hypothetical scenarios would violate this statute. While I cannot answer each hypothetical, I can address four foundational questions that give rise to these hypotheticals. They are as follows:

1. What does the statute mean by “nongovernmental person or entity”?
2. Does the statute prohibit public officials from collaborating with nongovernmental persons or entities even when the public official is not acting in his or her official capacity?
3. What does the statute mean by “collaborate”?
4. Which statute provides the penalty for violating R.C. 3501.054?

I

You first inquire as to the meaning of “nongovernmental person or entity.” R.C. 3501.054.

The statute does not define the phrase. So, it must be understood to retain its ordinary meaning. See *State v. Dorso*, 4 Ohio St.3d 60, 62 446 N.E.2d 449 (1983); 1994 Op. Att’y Gen. No. 94-025, at 2-110. In ordinary English, the word “governmental” describes “the act or process of governing, especially the control and administration of public policy in a political unit” and “the agency or apparatus through which a governing individual or body functions and exercises authority.” *The American Heritage Dictionary of the English Language* 761 (5th Ed.2011). See also R.C. 9.23(D)(1); R.C. 2909.05(B)(2) (provisions defining “governmental entity” in other contexts). Thus, a “nongovernmental” person or entity is one who is neither a government official (in the case of a person) or a governing entity. This accords with one definition that is contained in R.C. 3501.054, and which shows that the statute is trained on official action. In particular, R.C. 3501.054(A) defines “public officials” as “any elected or appointed officer, employee, or agent of the state or any political subdivision, board, commission, or other *public body established by law*.” (Emphasis added).

Together, the ordinary meaning and the statutory definition show that a “nongovernmental person or entity” is a person or entity that is neither an official nor a constituent part of a federal, state, or local

government. Put differently, a “nongovernmental person” is a person who is not (or is not acting in the capacity of) a public official. A “nongovernmental ... entity” is any entity that is not a public body established by law.

I note specifically that a political party would be a nongovernmental entity. Although regulated by certain statutes, political parties are not established by law and are not governmental entities. 2002 Op. Att’y Gen. No. 2002-028, at 2-186 to 2-187 (“Because political parties are basically voluntary associations of persons who act together principally for party and community purposes, such parties are not governmental entities”) (internal citations omitted).

II

You ask several questions regarding whether R.C. 3501.054 prohibits public officials from working with certain nongovernmental organizations. For example, you ask whether public officials are prohibited from collaborating with their own reelection campaign committees, or whether a public official would be prohibited from serving on a political party’s central or executive committee.

These questions are best answered by clarifying that R.C. 3501.054 prohibits a public official from collaborating with nongovernmental persons or entities *only* while the public official is acting in his or her official capacity. Nothing in R.C. 3501.054 explicitly limits a public official’s ability to collaborate with nongovernmental persons or entities when acting in

his or her private capacity. The language of the statute is concerned strictly with the official duties of a public official as they relate to election matters. See generally R.C. 3501.054. Thus, a public official is free to partake in nongovernmental activities related to election matters when he or she is not acting as a public official.

Two interpretive principles bolster my interpretation.

First, a statute should not be construed to fundamentally alter a governing scheme through vague or ancillary terms. See *Whitman v. Am. Trucking Assns.*, 531 U.S. 457, 468, 121 S. Ct. 903, 149 L.Ed.2d 1 (2001). As Justice Scalia colorfully explained, legislatures tend not to “hide elephants in mouseholes.” *Id.* By design, Ohio’s election system includes partisan actors. The chief elections officer is the Secretary of State, a partisan elected official. R.C. 3501.04. Other partisan elected officials have smaller election roles. See, e.g., R.C. 3501.34 (county sheriff to provide policing at polling places). By statute, county political parties recommend appointments to boards of election to the Secretary of State. R.C. 3501.07. Moreover, it is a common and longstanding practice for members of party central and executive committees to serve on boards of elections. See, e.g., *State ex rel. Summit Cty. Republican Party Executive Commt. v. Brunner*, 118 Ohio St.3d 515, 2008-Ohio-2824, 890 N.E.2d 888, ¶¶3-13. Construing R.C. 3501.054 to prohibit elected officials from collaborating with their own parties or election campaigns, or to prohibit party committee members from serving on boards of elections, would fundamentally alter Ohio’s system of elections. Indeed, it would alter

the State's entire system of government. R.C. 3501.34 is too small a mousehole to fit an elephant like that.

Second, construing R.C. 3501.054 to prohibit public officials from collaborating with nongovernmental persons and entities, *even when not acting as a public official*, would create serious constitutional concerns. Public officials do not surrender their constitutional rights to freedom of speech and association upon taking office. *See, e.g.*, 2014 Op. Att'y Gen. No. 2014-005, Slip Op. at 6; 2-36 ("A person does not relinquish his constitutional right to freely express himself about governmental activities, operations, programs, and policies under the First Amendment of the United States Constitution and Article I, § 11 of the Ohio Constitution when he is elected to statewide office"); *see also* 1991 Op. Att'y Gen. No. 91-064, at 2-309 (Officials and employees of a board of education have a constitutional right of free speech, and individuals have the right to conduct certain activities in a private and uncompensated capacity). Furthermore, all statutes are presumed constitutional, R.C. 1.47(A), and I must interpret any ambiguity in a constitutionally permissible way. *See* 2021 Op. Att'y Gen. No. 2021-024, Slip Op. at 6; *State ex rel. Purdy v. Clermont Cty. Bd. of Elections*, 77 Ohio St.3d 338, 345-346, 673 N.E.2d 1351 (1997). Since construing R.C. 3501.054 to prohibit officials from collaborating with nongovernmental entities even in the officials' private capacities would create grave constitutional concerns, I must construe the statute to be limited to when the public official is acting as a public official. *See State ex rel. Crawford v. Indus. Comm. of Ohio*, 110 Ohio St. 271, 280, 143 N.E. 574

(1924); accord *Gonzalez v. United States*, 553 U.S. 242, 251, 128 S.Ct. 1765, 170 L.Ed.2d 616 (2008).

Therefore, I conclude that R.C. 3501.054 prohibits public officials from collaborating with nongovernmental persons or entities only when the public official is acting in his or her official capacity. It does not, for example, prohibit a board of elections member from serving on a political party central or executive committee.

III

Your letter presents the question of what the word “collaborate” means in R.C. 3501.054. I turn to that now.

Neither the statute nor any other part of the Revised Code defines “collaborate.” As such, it should be given its common, everyday meaning. *State v. Dorso*, 4 Ohio St.3d 60, 62, 446 N.E.2d 449 (1983); 1994 Op. Att’y Gen. No. 94-025, at 2-110. In ordinary speech, “collaborate” means “to work together, especially in a joint intellectual effort.” *The American Heritage Dictionary of the English Language* 361 (5th Ed.2011). It means “to work jointly with others or together esp. in an intellectual endeavor.” *Merriam Webster’s Collegiate Dictionary* 243 (11th Ed.2005). In sum, two or more parties “collaborate” when they combine their efforts to work toward a common goal. Succinctly stated, collaboration entails “jointly administering a project.”

Because collaboration entails the joint administration of a project, it *does not* cover a great many of the tasks in which officials might engage. Merely providing information to a third party—for example, answering a

non-profit organization's questions about registration requirements—would not qualify as the joint administration of a project. Nor would setting up a booth to register voters or recruit poll workers at an event hosted by another entity. These activities do not combine the efforts of a public official and a nongovernmental entity towards a specific plan. Instead, such activities represent solo projects undertaken in mere proximity to one another, or in furtherance of a similar goal.

This understanding of “collaborate” finds support from the just-discussed elephants-in-mouseholes canon. Numerous sections in the Revised Code explicitly or implicitly require, or authorize, elections officials to interact with nongovernmental persons or entities. For example:

- R.C. 3501.03 (boards of election “shall have authority to publicize information relative to registration or elections”);
- R.C. 3501.05(Z) (Secretary of State to “conduct voter education outlining voter identification, absent voters ballot, provisional ballot, and other voting requirements”);
- R.C. 3501.051 (Secretary of State may authorize youth mock voting program to be run by volunteers);
- R.C. 3503.12 (boards of election to advertise in newspapers advertising voter registration info);

- R.C. 3501.22 (boards of election shall work with non-public schools to recruit high school poll workers);
- R.C. 3501.302; 3506.03 (numerous provisions authorizing boards of elections to purchase elections supplies).

Any broader reading of “collaborate” would cause R.C. 3501.054 to implicitly repeal these and other laws. Statutes should not be read to implicitly effect so significant a change if they can be read not to do so.

Although I cannot answer whether every hypothetical interaction between elections officials and nongovernmental persons or entities would constitute collaboration, I can provide a few concrete examples of interactions that would *not* constitute “collaboration”:

- Providing election information to a nongovernmental person or entity, whether orally or in writing;
- Speaking at, providing election information at, or conducting election activities (such as registering voters or recruiting poll-workers) at an event hosted by a nongovernmental person or entity;
- Publishing election information on a medium owned or hosted by a nongovernmental person or entity (such as a newspaper, radio or television broadcast, website, or bulletin board), whether for free or as paid advertising.

None of these examples constitute jointly administering a project. In addition, R.C. 3501.054 would not prohibit elections officials from performing any actions that they are otherwise authorized to perform by the Revised Code.

IV

Finally, you ask what statute provides the penalty for violating R.C. 3501.054. There are just two potential candidates: R.C. 3599.32 and R.C. 3599.40. After analyzing both statutes, I conclude that R.C. 3599.32 provides the penalty.

R.C. 3599.32 states:

No official upon whom a duty is imposed by an election law for the violation of which no penalty is otherwise provided shall knowingly disobey such election law. Whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree.

R.C. 3599.40 states:

Except as otherwise provided in section 3599.39, whoever violates any provision of Title XXXV of the Revised Code, unless otherwise provided in such title, and whoever violates division (D) of section 9.03 of the Revised Code, is guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree.

Violating R.C. 3501.054 fits some of the requirements of both statutes—R.C. 3501.054 is an election law in Title XXXV, and does not contain a specific penalty. However, R.C. 3599.32 applies specifically to *officials*, while R.C. 3599.40 applies to everyone. As a more specific statute, R.C. 3599.32 prevails over the more general R.C. 3599.40. R.C. 1.51; see *State ex rel. Motor Carrier Serv. v. Rankin*, 135 Ohio St. 3d 395, 2013-Ohio-1505, 987 N.E.2d 670, ¶¶26-29. Therefore, a penalty for violating R.C. 3501.054 is “otherwise provided” in Title XXXV, and the penalty found in R.C. 3599.40 would not apply. As such, I conclude that R.C. 3599.32 provides the penalty for violating R.C. 3501.054.

A violation of R.C. 3599.32 is a misdemeanor of the first degree. If the person has previously been convicted of a violation of Title XXXV, the violation is a felony of the fourth degree. R.C. 3599.39.

Conclusion

Accordingly, it is my opinion, and you are hereby advised that:

1. For purposes of R.C. 3501.054, a “nongovernmental person or entity” is a person or entity that is neither an official nor a constituent part of a federal, state, or local government.
2. R.C. 3501.054 prohibits public officials from collaborating with nongovernmental persons or entities *only* when the public official is acting in his or her official capacity. It does not prohibit public officials from collaborating

with nongovernmental persons or entities in the official's private capacity. It does not, for example, prohibit a board of elections member from serving as a member or in a leadership role of a county political party central or executive committee.

3. As used in R.C. 3501.054, "collaborate" means to jointly administer a project.
4. The clause in R.C. 3501.054 that prohibits public officials from collaborating with nongovernmental persons or entities does not prohibit a public official from performing any action that the public official is authorized to perform by a different section of the Revised Code.
5. R.C. 3599.32 provides the penalty for violating R.C. 3501.054.

SUMMARY

- *Directive 2021-21* provides instructions on how to review, examine, and verify signatures on a petition proposing an initiated statute.
- No board may invalidate a part-petition solely because a circulator statement includes a number that is lower than the number of signatures the part-petition actually contains, so long as there is no indication of fraud or material misrepresentation
- Each board of elections must complete its review, examination, and verification of the petition and return its certification to the Secretary of State's Office (SOS) no later than **12 noon on Thursday, Dec. 30, 2021**.

PETITION SUBMITTED

On Monday, Dec. 20, 2021, the SOS received a petition for an initiated statute. The Cuyahoga County Board of Elections (CCBOE) must examine each part-petition to determine the number of qualified electors who signed the petition.

VERIFYING THE VALIDITY OF PART-PETITIONS AND SIGNATURES

1. The CCBOE must process all new, valid voter registrations, and changes of names and addresses to existing registrations received by the board or from the SOS as of the date the petition was filed with the SOS before verifying the signatures on the part-petitions.
2. The CCBOE must verify all petition signatures, electronically record decisions on the validity or invalidity of each signature on the voter registration record, and ensure that the voter registration record is updated with voter activity credit if the signature and address match.
3. The board must check each part-petition to determine whether the circulator's statement on the part-petition was properly completed. The entire part-petition may be invalid if the circulator's statement is not completed as required by law. **However, no board may invalidate a part-petition solely because a circulator statement includes a number that is lower than the number of signatures the part-petition actually contains, so long as there is no indication of fraud or material misrepresentation.**
4. A circulator must indicate the number of signatures on the part-petition and attest under penalty of election falsification that they witnessed the affixing of every signature. Thus, a board may invalidate a part-petition when it has evidence that a circulator committed fraud or material misrepresentation.

COMPLETING PART-PETITION SPREADSHEETS

If the CCBOE receives a part-petition with a majority of signatures from another county, it must not verify that part-petition. Instead, the CCBOE must promptly follow the steps outlined in *Directive 2021-21* on how to transmit a scanned copy of a part-petition(s) to another county board, then how to return the original part-petition(s) to the SOS.

If the CCBOE receives a scanned copy of a part-petition(s) from another county, it must follow the steps outlined in *Directive 2021-21* on how to proceed.

FULFILLING PUBLIC RECORDS REQUESTS

The CCBOE may receive public records requests for copies of the part-petitions. It should consult with its statutory legal counsel, the county prosecuting attorney, before rejecting, fulfilling, or responding to any public records request.

CERTIFICATION & RETURN OF PETITIONS

As soon as the board finishes verifying the signatures on the part-petitions, the board must follow the steps outlined in *Directive 2021-21*. **All certification forms and scanned images of petitions must be submitted through SharePoint by 12 noon on Thursday, Dec. 30, 2021.**

All original part-petitions must be received by the SOS no later than Friday, Jan. 7, 2022.

Re: Instructions Regarding the Review, Examination, and Verification of the Petition
Proposing an Initiated Statute (An Act to Control and Regulate Adult Use Cannabis)

SUMMARY

This Directive provides instructions to county boards of elections on the review, examination, and verification of signatures on the petition proposing an initiated statute.¹ Each board of elections must complete its review, examination, and verification consistent with [Chapter 11](#) and [Chapter 14](#) of the Ohio Election Official Manual and return its certification to the Secretary of State's Office no later than **12:00 noon on Thursday, December 30, 2021**.

PETITION SUBMITTED

On Monday, December 20, 2021, the Secretary of State's Office received a petition for an initiated statute. Boards of elections must examine each part-petition to determine the number of qualified electors who signed the petition.

VERIFYING THE VALIDITY OF PART-PETITIONS AND SIGNATURES

The board must carefully read this Directive, [Chapter 11](#), and [Chapter 14](#) of the Election Official Manual before the board examines the petitions sent to your county.

1. The board must process all new, valid voter registrations, and changes of names and addresses to existing registrations received by the board or from the Secretary of State's Office as of the date the petition was filed with the Secretary of State before verifying the signatures on the part-petitions. These registrations are effective as of the date the petition was filed with the Secretary of State.²
2. The board must verify all petition signatures, electronically record decisions on the validity or invalidity of each signature on the voter registration record, track for duplicate signatures, and ensure that the voter registration record is updated with voter activity credit if the signature and address match.

3. The board must check each part-petition to determine whether the circulator's statement on the part-petition was properly completed. The entire part-petition may be invalid if the circulator's statement is not completed as required by law.³ However, no board may invalidate a part-petition solely because a circulator statement includes a number that is lower than the number of signatures the part-petition actually contains,⁴ so long as there is no indication of fraud or material misrepresentation.⁵
4. A circulator must indicate the number of signatures on the part-petition and attest under penalty of election falsification that they witnessed the affixing of every signature.⁶ Thus, a board may invalidate a part-petition when it has evidence that a circulator committed fraud or material misrepresentation.⁷ Moreover, the board must document and notify elections counsel through legal intake, if it has evidence that a circulator committed fraud.

COMPLETING PART-PETITION SPREADSHEETS

If a board receives a part-petition with a majority of signatures from another county, that board of elections must not verify that part-petition. Instead, the board must promptly follow the steps below, complete the following two spreadsheets accompanying this Directive, and return the spreadsheets in the envelopes provided when all part-petitions are returned to the Secretary of State's Office:

1. Part-Petitions Sent Spreadsheet (Original Part-Petition(s)), and
2. Part-Petitions Received from Another Board Spreadsheet (Scanned Part-Petition(s)).

If a board of elections receives a part-petition(s) that belongs to another county:

1. Contact the Director or Deputy Director at the other county board by phone to notify them that your board will forward a scanned copy of a part-petition(s).
2. Log the transfer of the part-petition(s) going to another county on the "Part-Petitions Sent" spreadsheet.
3. Send the copy of the part-petition(s) via email to the Director and Deputy Director.
4. Return the original part-petition(s) with the "Part-Petitions Sent" spreadsheet in the marked envelope included with the original part-petitions. When the board returns its reviewed part-petitions to the Secretary of State's Office, place the envelope with the part-petition and respective spreadsheet enclosed on top of the reviewed part-petitions so it can be easily located and retrieved from the box.

If a board of elections receives a scanned copy of a part-petition from another county:

1. Log the part-petition(s) that the board receives on the “Part-Petitions Received” spreadsheet.
2. Print and process the part-petition(s).
3. Return the emailed part-petition(s) with the “Part-Petitions Received” spreadsheet to the Secretary of State’s Office in the marked envelope included with the original part-petitions. When the board returns its reviewed part-petitions to the Secretary of State’s Office, place the envelope with the part-petition and respective spreadsheet enclosed on top of the reviewed part-petitions so it can be easily located and retrieved from the box.

Note: Even if a board does not email a copy of a part-petition to another county and/or does not receive a copy of a part-petition from another county, the board must enter the county name and mark the box (X) in the top right-hand corner of the spreadsheet and place it in the correct envelope. When the board returns its reviewed part-petitions to the Secretary of State’s Office, place both envelopes on top of the reviewed part-petitions so they can be easily located and retrieved from the box.

SCANNING THE PART-PETITIONS

After the board finishes checking the signatures on the part-petitions, the board must electronically scan each part-petition. A copy of the scanned images must be uploaded to the Secretary of State’s SharePoint site (using the instructions accompanying this Directive). Each board must retain an electronic copy of the images for the board’s records.

FULFILLING PUBLIC RECORDS REQUESTS

Boards of elections may receive public records requests for copies of the part-petitions. Boards should consult with their statutory legal counsel, the county prosecuting attorney, before rejecting, fulfilling, or responding to any public records request.

CERTIFICATION & RETURN OF PETITIONS

As soon as the board finishes verifying the signatures on the part-petitions, the board must:

1. Complete and submit the certification form electronically by clicking the “submit” button on the bottom of the form;
2. Verify that the form received a timestamp;
3. Print and save a copy of the completed certification form containing the timestamp;
4. Have the Director and Deputy Director sign the time stamped certification form; and
5. Upload the signed certification form to the SharePoint site.⁸

If upon submitting the form via Elect Collect the board does not receive a timestamp, immediately contact this office at 1-614-466-2585. All certification forms and scanned images

The board must include all expenses incurred during calendar year 2021 and expended from the board's appropriations, even if the bills for such expenses have not yet been paid. However, it must not include expenses that were funded through the 2020 Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security ("CARES") Act, the Help America Vote Act ("HAVA"), or any other grant funds disbursed to the board of elections.

SUMMARY

Pursuant to the requirements of [R.C. 3501.11\(N\)](#), each board of elections must provide an annual expense report to the Secretary of State's Office that includes expenditures made in administering elections and other supplemental information. Boards must submit these reports by **March 1, 2022** to our Office. [R.C. 3501.05\(O\)](#) requires the Secretary of State's Office to submit an annual report to the Governor containing the results of elections, the cost of elections in the various counties, a tabulation of the votes in the several political subdivisions, and other information and recommendations relative to elections. The Secretary of State's Office utilizes the reports from the boards of elections to prepare the annual report to the Governor.

INSTRUCTIONS

Each board of elections must use the prescribed form accompanying this Directive to report expenses, the number of elections, number of employees, and types of voting systems. The board must include all expenses incurred during calendar year 2021 and expended from the board's appropriations, even if the bills for such expenses have not yet been paid. However, when preparing the report, do not include expenses that were funded through the 2020 Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security ("CARES") Act, the Help America Vote Act ("HAVA"), or any other grant funds disbursed to the board of elections. In addition, a section was added for the board to record items paid with other county funds and not from the board's budget appropriation.

It is important that each board complete the form accurately. Each board must review and verify to ensure the numbers are correct and the totals balance properly. The completed form must be submitted to our Office no later than **March 1, 2022** by selecting the submit button on the bottom of the form.
